Do You Believe God Loves You?

"I have loved you with an everlasting love" Jeremiah 31:3

I hear the following question often:

Q: How can I believe God loves me because of the bad things I have done. Here's Billy Graham's answer:

"If God treated us the way we treat other people, then you'd probably be right. If someone insults us or hurts us, we usually don't want anything more to do with them. We may even want to strike back at them and hurt them in return. But God isn't like this! Even when we ignore Him or insult Him by the way we live. He still reaches out to us and wants us to come back to Him. He doesn't love our sin—but He still loves us, and He still yearns for us to love Him in return. The Bible says, "I have loved you with an everlasting love" Jeremiah 31:3. How do we know God loves us? Listen: If He didn't love us, He never would have sent His only Son into the world to die for us. But Jesus Christ did come into the world, and He did die on the cross for our sins. Why did He do this? The only possible explanation is because God loves us. The Bible says, "This is love: not that we loved God, but that He loved us and sent His Son as an atoning sacrifice for our sins" 1 John 4:10. Don't trust your emotions; they can deceive you. Instead, trust Christ and what He has done for you. Invite Him to come into your life today, and then thank Him every morning for His unchanging love for you."

I must admit it was once my struggle to believe whether God loved me due to some childhood hurdles and wrong concepts. I thought I must do or not do certain things in order to know God's love. My mother's mental illness and our lack of bonding was also a stronghold in my life. As I read through the Scriptures, God began to show me how very much He loved me and I long for you to find the same assurance.

The trouble is we don't believe Him. Why don't you sit with His Word and let Him show you His perfect agape love? Don't go by your feelings, go by what He says and choose to believe Him in 2020. Soak in His Word and listen to soaking music on You Tube and meditate on the scriptures that it shows. It will encourage you.

Good For You

Proverbs 24:13-14 - "Eat honey, my son, for it is good: honey from the comb is sweet to your taste. Know also that wisdom is like honey for you: If you find it, there is a future hope for you and your hope will not be cut off."

People the world over spent an estimated \$98.2 billion on chocolate in 2016. The number is staggering, yet at the same time not all that surprising. Chocolate, after all, tastes delicious and we enjoy consuming it. So the world rejoiced collectively when the sweet treat was found to have significant health benefits as well. Chocolate contains flavonoids that help safe guard the body against aging and heart disease. Never has a prescription for health been so well received or heeded (in moderation, of course!).
